## A Word from Mr. Bowar HEAD OF SCHOOL

**I'd like you to meet Noelle, a 4<sup>th</sup> grader at SCCS.** Noelle is a student full of life and a passion for learning. She likes to dance, sing, and make friends. Noelle spends most of her day with her 4<sup>th</sup> grade class and part of her day working on specific skills with a resource teacher. Throughout the day, she is supported by a paraprofessional. Noelle also happens to have Down syndrome, but, more importantly, **she is a child of God.**

**Meet Colton, a 5<sup>th</sup> grader at SCCS.** Colton is very social and loves playing outside in the winter and on his basketball team. He likes the farm and spending time with his friends. He spends most of his day with fellow 5<sup>th</sup> graders and part of the day getting support from a resource teacher and paraprofessionals. Colton also happens to have spina bifida, but, more importantly, **he is a child of God.**

**Now meet Graham, a 1<sup>st</sup> grader at SCCS.** Graham loves letters and reading. He is excited about learning new things and likes to be with his friends. Graham spends all of his day with his 1<sup>st</sup> grade class and is supported by his teacher, our behavior specialist, and paraprofessionals. Graham also happens to have autism, but, more importantly, **he is a child of God.**

**In 2011, we began the journey toward being as inclusive as possible in the education that happens at Sioux Center Christian School.** Since then, our school has moved forward in several areas, and we are so thankful for the opportunities God has provided us to serve His kids. We continue to make strides in being as inclusive as possible.

Using the **Response to Intervention framework** (which relies on research-based curriculum and instruction, screening of students, interventions for students at all levels, progress monitoring, and data-based decision-making), all students at SCCS are served in levels of tier 1, tier 2, and tier 3.

**Why do we do this?** A large part of fulfilling our mission statement includes involving students with varying needs. While we realize we may not be able to serve the needs of all children, **we deeply hope to include as many children with varying needs as we possibly can.** The goal of inclusive education is to **include, support, and challenge our diverse learners to reach their potential as servants in God's world.** Inclusive education is not a program; rather, it is a philosophy, a desire. **God created all children, and we want the Kingdom of God to be well represented at SCCS.**

What makes us distinct? **We desire to be a school that provides a home for each student in the general education classroom and equips all students with the necessary support for academic and social success.** We strive to put people and programs around children whose parents desire a Christian education for them. This philosophy applies to all children in our school. **We believe that a child's value comes from being created in God's image.** Because of this belief, **all students belong.** We also believe that everyone can and should learn and develop. While we do use data and quality instruction, we believe children are image-bearers, not numbers or test results or graphs. **We want them to learn and grow in their faith and talents and seek to partner with Christian parents in doing so.** We are one in the Spirit and one in Christ. We are interdependent and all called to discipleship.

**How do we work to accomplish these ideals? We rely on God's help and guidance through the work of His people,** with our inclusive education framework fulfilled through several faculty and staff members, including: classroom and specials teachers, 4 resource teachers, a guidance counselor, a talented and gifted teacher, Title I reading support, a school nurse, a behavior specialist, a sensory specialist, several paraprofessionals, and on-site occupational and speech therapists. All faculty and staff members are fully certified, highly trained in their area(s) of expertise, and teach from a Christian perspective.

In early March, we challenged our students to consider ways that, as part of God's Story, we as a school could **share the Easter story** with others. ## LEGACY PLAN UPDATE

SCOTT HULSTEIN, PRESIDENT OF LEGACY PLAN TEAM

**Our mission as one society of believers is to support the distinct, Christ-centered education of God's precious children, with a lifelong commitment of prayer, sharing of spiritual gifts, and financial support.**

60% of our annual school budget is provided by parents' investment through tuition, plus NICSTO and TRIP contributions. The remaining 40% of the budget relies on the provision of our society of believers, which is called the Legacy Plan.

**The 2017-18 goal for the Legacy Plan is \$1,365,000, and we have received \$774,009 through March 31.**

**We are 66.67% of the way through the year, with the YTD goal of \$910,000.**

We are **so thankful for your faithful support** of Sioux Center Christian School through the Legacy Plan and **encourage your continued generous giving**, so that we may reach 100% of the goal to provide for SCCS by the end of July 2018.

## EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

**Sensory Specialist:** Duties include working with classroom teachers, our behavior specialist, and our occupational therapist to design effective sensory activities for students who benefit from regular sensory breaks. This person would also support teachers using sensory and activity breaks in the general education classroom. This is a full-time hourly position, working only during the school year.

**Paraprofessional:** Duties include supporting a student one-on-one, supporting students during unstructured times (like recess and lunch), and working with small groups. This position has the potential to be full- or part-time when school is in session, depending on a combination of candidate preference and current staff schedules.

**TRIP Assistant:** Duties include the daily operations of the TRIP Office, working in collaboration with the director of finance. This person would run the front window, interact with customers on a regular basis, and perform general data entry and record-keeping. This is an hourly, year-long position, and hours are 8:00-1:00 three days per week.

Carol Koekkoek and Virginia Vermeer remember initiating the idea along with Thelma Broek, Lena Fedders, and Phyllis Kelly. Now the group has grown to twelve and they find that is a good number... just right for fitting around the tables with their projects, and just right for the amount of work they have waiting for them each week.

These volunteers are the precision engineers behind several famous things you may have seen your children and grandchildren come home with ... pilgrim vests, pop-up books, Arthur's glasses, spiders (consensus is that Charlotte the spider is not their favorite project :)), burlap squares for 2nd grade embroidery, and much, much more!

**They experience joy in doing this "busy work", while talking, sharing, and laughing together.** They find inspiration and encouragement from each other and fulfillment in serving teachers and students (plus several ladies are former teachers).

## STORIES FROM THE HALLWAYS

- The Iowa Reading Association has chosen **Mr. Bowar as Reading Administrator of the Year**. He was nominated by the Northwest Iowa Reading Council and selected at the state level. Josh will be honored at a banquet during the State Reading Conference in June.
- In order to continue to meet student needs and enhance learning, the **junior high teachers have been working to create flexible seating options for our 7th and 8th graders**. Supported by PACE special projects and a potential matching grant, the **teachers have worked with students to design the best possible learning spaces**. Students worked in groups to research best practices and furniture options, create scale models, and present their ideas to the teachers. We hope to have the furniture in place by the fall.

## DESTINATION IMAGINATION REBECCA DE SMITH, DISCOVERY TEACHER

This year, SCCS offered a new after-school enrichment program called Destination Imagination to seven 4<sup>th</sup> graders. **D.I. is an educational program that promotes creativity, problem solving skills, teamwork, STEM concepts, and 21<sup>st</sup> century skills**. The students were presented with a variety of open-ended challenges that required them to work together to create original solutions to problems *without help from adults*.

Our team of 4<sup>th</sup> graders chose to participate in the **Maze Craze Technical Challenge** at a regional tournament in New Ulm, MN, on March 17. They created a robotic Maze Traveler who navigated a maze while they acted out a story for the D.I. Appraisers.

**These 4<sup>th</sup> graders did a fantastic job of representing SCCS at this tournament!**
