Clear is Kind (Unclear is Unkind)

Here are some thoughts that run through the mind of a school leader: Is my school's message being heard? Are people listening? Are we being clear?

At Sioux Center Christian School, we follow a set of internal norms, our "rules of the road" when it comes to working together as colleagues and with students, parents, and supporters. These norms were written collaboratively by our faculty and staff, and all employees and administration are held to them. They provide a framework, help everyone know what to expect, and embed guidance and accountability.

Norms are important. Research shows that organizations with a clear set of norms are strong organizations. Norms provide safety and structure while also encouraging growth and creativity. And that is what we want SCCS to be, a thriving place for the benefit of our students.




Here are the norms we follow, all under the umbrella of our biblical framework, our mission as a school: 1. Communicate regularly (face-to-face is often best). 2. In conflict, seek direction through prayer and wise counsel (seek guidance versus gossip). Focus on solutions. Follow

Matthew 18. 3. Assume positive intent; trust, but verify. 4. Put student needs first. 5. Provide and seek kind, specific, and helpful feedback. 6. Celebrate and support each other. 7. Take healthy risks. 8. Remain flexible, focused on growth. 9. Balance professional and personal needs. 10. Face reality boldly. These norms show up in conversations, when we're working through conflict, when we're making decisions, and more.

Please don't mistake these norms as ways that we can hide behind nice language or as me saying that we have a perfect school. In fact, the opposite is true. Norms help us lean into hard things. They inspire courage over comfort. They encourage getting into the grittiness of life, digging deep with each other for the benefit of our team and the school culture. Author Brene Brown, in







Norms are about being clear because clear is kind. They don't cause people to wonder what's expected. **They** help us save that mental energy for more important things, like providing a fantastic learning experience for our students.

Let me be clear about one thing as I close. Thank you for your support of Sioux Center Christian School. Our school is thriving. I can tell you that experiencing Christian employees working at a Christian school is a beautiful thing. Employees committed to providing an intentionally Christian education are thriving and living out their part in God's Story as they invite our kids into His Story with them. And, because of that, our students are thriving and are getting a top-notch education, one that treasures them as image bearers of God, one that trains them in God's Truth through strong faith nurturing and academics, and one that seeks to transform them through the power of the Holy Spirit.



Seven months have flown by since we opened the doors of Outlet 75. It seems a bit surreal to be at this stage when it feels like yesterday we were sitting in the orchestra room brainstorming how to bring in additional revenue for our school! (It was 18 months ago!) Stepping out in faith and setting goals (having really no idea if they were realistic), we can look back and see God's faithfulness in every detail.

After just seven months in business, with the help of generous start-up donors and the SCCS Foundation match to those donations, plus MANY hours of volunteer labor and consistent weekly profits, we have **completely paid for all our** start-up construction costs and start up inventory purchases (\$65,000)! We are now self-sustaining (revenue will cover inventory costs, paid managers, and overhead expenses) and we plan to kick back our profits to school in quarterly payouts (which we will report to you in the future).

We are excited to report that weekly sales are consistently at or above what the planning team projected. We have customers who shop regularly plus new customers every week, all **thrilled with the deals they find on new clothing**, **shoes**, **home décor**, **and furniture!**





The Foundation provided a total matching grant of \$23,583 toward the start-up costs of Outlet 75, our new retail store that solely supports the mission of SCCS.



This new curriculum is based on current reading instruction and phonics research and was mostly funded by a Sioux Center Christian School Foundation grant of \$35,000. Our TK students are enjoying the F&P Shared Reading for Pre-Kindergarten Program, which builds a strong early reading foundation with books that engage and excite children into the world of literacy. Shared reading is enjoyable and an important opportunity for children to experience more challenging texts (1-2 levels higher than what they are reading) while also acquiring the tools they need to read text independently.
- Mrs. Den Boer's 7th grade class and Mrs. Linda Feekes' 3rd grade class got together as a Storyline Connection Group in September and worked on a prayer rock project together. They walked to the prayer garden on the Dordt Prairie and placed their rocks to share encouragement with the community.

After studying many areas of lowa's history, the 5th grade class, their teachers, and a few parent volunteers had the privilege of learning by way of a field experience. We started the day together at 5:00 AM on October 11th. Our first stop in **Des Moines was Living History Farms**. The students had a choice of touring the farms set up to display various times in history or of touring a town set up to show life in the late 1800's. Our next stop was the state capitol building. They've participated in a **Kahoot game** with 50,000 students around the globe to review chapters of *The Bridge Home*, a book they are reading as part of the Global Read Aloud project. They have also participated in **Mystery Hangouts**, where each student has a role and, through clues, work to figure out the mystery location.

We have implemented a new school-wide communication app, called Bloomz, to better connect teachers and parents. The goal is to streamline communication, so that most school-related information (classroom newsletters, reminders, schedules) can be found in one place. It has taken some adjusting, but it does make keeping in touch with classroom teachers easier. Plus, teachers can safely give parents a "window into the classroom" with frequently posted pictures, which can only be seen by classroom parents.

BUILDING EXPANSION DEBT REPORT MRS. AMY VANDER BERG, DIR OF DEVELOPMENT & PROMOTIONS

We are **blessed to report** that in 2018-19, the debt on the 2015 building expansion project was **lowered by \$516,279** through pledged donations, new donations, and Trail'Raiser Night donations. Our current **actual debt is \$879,000**. As we approach the final countdown on the debt, we believe sharing the actual debt amount is clearer than sharing the "actual debt minus pledged donations" amount (which is a standard practice). We still **anticipate receiving many Forward in Faith and One Thousand Blessings pledged donations**, but also look forward to **encouraging donations** from new and past donors as we approach a zero balance!

Our **2019 year-end goal is to pay off the \$286,000 bank loan**, which matures on Dec. 31. The remaining debt is owed to supporters who invested in a Certificate of Deposit program, which has given them above-market annual interest earnings each year (which many forgave), while providing school with lower interest loans. We are so thankful for these investors and look forward to paying back their investment.

We are SO VERY THANKFUL for this wonderful building (including the older parts!) that daily protects and surrounds over 600 of God's treasures (students, faculty, staff), as we learn and live God's Story together. Our building is God's workmanship -

designed and equipped so that we can daily learn, live, and walk out its doors to serve as agents of transformation in our homes, neighborhoods, and the world!

We are BLESSED by every dollar given in the past and in the future for our building! Look for our end of the year building drive in November and please prayerfully consider how you can contribute to the EXCITING END of the debt on our building project!

Greetings from the board of trustees! The first part of a school year is a great time to think about goals and plans for the rest of the year. As a result of a self-assessment process, the board of trustees has written the following goals for itself:

Participate in topical and themed education opportunities. At each board meeting, trustees learn about and discuss topics related to the future of Christian education. Trustees read articles and chapters, watch videos, and talk about what God might have in store for the future of SCCS. The current topics of conversation have revolved around increasing the diversity represented in our student body.

Receive regular updates on the strategic plan, including measurements. Each month, Dr. Bowar provides us with a measurement scorecard that is based on the strategic plan. The scorecard includes measurements related to board policy manual updates, Outlet 75 distributions, Tales and Trails income, information included in a 5-year budget projection, Legacy Plan income, the Foundation balance, number of teacher walkthroughs completed, percentage of curriculum maps completed, and number of planned improvements for grades 7-8 completed.

Provide consistent communication with stakeholders. The trustees have made it their goal to keep providing consistent communication with stakeholders, which will be done through The Bulletin Board, messages on Bloomz, email information, and other avenues.

Be visible at school events. Trustees love seeing the school in action. As a result, we will be having two trustee visit days at school, one in October and one in February. Trustees will visit the school while it is in session so that they can get a first-hand experience of the Christian education happening at SCCS. Trustees also plan to be visible at several other school events.

CSI ACCREDITATION DR. JOSH BOWAR, HEAD OF SCHOOL

Sioux Center Christian School is a fully accredited school in the State of Iowa. We have achieved this accreditation status through independent accreditation from Christian Schools International (CSI).

Being accredited means that we meet (and exceed) all state standards for schools as well as standards set forth by CSI. Accreditation also gives us access to busing, services from Northwest Area Education Agency, and other state and federal programs. It's a way to hold ourselves accountable to high standards of excellence in Christian education.

During the 2014-2015 school year, we worked through the process of becoming accredited through CSI, which lasts for 5 years. Several things have been implemented at school as a result of our accreditation process: strategic plan, mission-directed governance, curriculum mapping, Teaching for Transformation, and a faculty and staff evaluation system.

It's now time to start the next round of accreditation this school year, and we have our **site visit April 2020.** We have started the process with stakeholder surveys, and we have been working in teams internally to assess ourselves against the accreditation standards. In December, we will be working on writing a school improvement plan based on the data we've gathered.

We covet your prayers as we work through this very important process, and we look forward to what God has in store for us with the next accreditation plan!
